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1. **Meet the eligibility requirements:** To be eligible for certification, you must have a current RN license and at least two years of experience in orthopedic oncology nursing.
2. **Complete the application:** The application for the NOOCBR can be found on the ONCC website. The application fee is \$250.
3. **Take the certification exam:** The certification exam is a computer-based exam that consists of 175 multiple-choice questions. The exam is timed and you have four hours to complete it.
4. **Receive your certification:** If you pass the certification exam, you will be awarded the NOOCBR certification. The certification is valid for five years.

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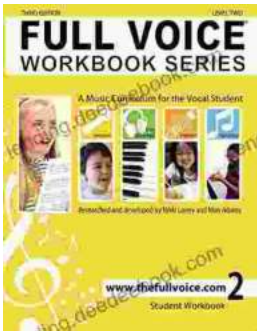
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
